- continue to subscribe to the Real PE scheme, ensuring staff have CPD throughout the year
- hiring qualified sports coaches to extend current extracurricular opportunities

- introducing more new sports and physical activities (e.g. fencing, cricket, tennis) to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- providing more extra-curricular activities at lunchtime and after school
